




"Sunday in Normandy" by Lawrence Beall Smith of a collecting station of the 104th Med Bn outside St. Lo.

Major Faries, born in 1899, volunteered for active duty as Regimental Surgeon of the 190th FA in January, 1941. After Camp Shelby and the Carolina maneuvers he shipped on the Queen

Elizabeth to the British Isles in September, 1942. As the invasion drew near, he was offered a position in the rear, but instead chose to transfer to the 29th Division in January, 1944, to take part in the D-Day invasion as XO of the104th Med. Bn. Major Faries served in the campaigns of Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, and Central Europe, receiving the Bronze Star, the European Campaign Ribbon with four Battle Stars, and the Amphibious Invasion Arrowhead, the American Defense Medal, and the Meritorious Unit Citation. In December, 1945, he was discharged with the rank of Lt. Colonel and returned to his general medical practice in Lewisburg, PA.




Brigadier General Norman D. Cota Recommended to Pentagon for upgrade of DSC to Medal of Honor

Un D-Day, when Brigadier General Norman Daniel Cota landed on Omaha Beach at Dog White, he was the oldest man on the beach. His actions that day serve as a model in battlefield leadership and willingness to serve in the face of overwhelming opposition and against long odds. In August 2018, a bi-partisan Congressional group under the leadership of the Honorable Senator Pat Roberts of Kansas submitted a letter to the Army to formally request an upgrade of the Distinguished Service Cross (DSC) to the Medal of Honor (MOH) for General Cota. This effort has been intense and has active support from MG Epperly, CG, 29th Infantry Division, and former CGs, MG Ortner (still on active duty), MG Whittington (currently at NGB), MG Langley (Ret), MG Hayden (Ret), MG Long (Ret), MG Batts (Ret), MG Childers (Ret), LTG Blum (Ret) and distinguished 29th Infantry Division Historian, Joe Balkoski among others. The Award Recommendation was accompanied by new eyewitness statements from our D-Day brethren from the 5th Ranger Infantry Battalion, MG John C. Raaen, Jr. (Ret) and Pfc Randall Ching. We are very excited to make the Association aware of this activity as this honor for General Cota is long overdue.

On July 29, 1944, AP Correspondent Don Whitehead wrote "When Brig. Gen. Norman Daniel Cota sings to himself, the boys of the 29th Division know everything is moving along smoothly. But when the general doesn't sing, there's something wrong... He usually is found around the front lines where the fighting is toughest, and he moves with complete disregard for his own safety, finding out for himself what is going on and cheering up his men with his good humor." General Cota saw something in the battlefield no one else did and discerned a path to victory. He understood instantly that the draws were death, not conquerable in a frontal assault. The only way to win was to switch tactics completely and send the men to the top of the bluffs and take the Germans from the ridge line.

This remembrance from the joint effort of Carroll D. Childers, MG (USA Retired - 15th CG 29IID), 1996-1999, and Noel Mehlo, chief researcher for Cota DSC-to-MOH upgrade.






Cota was the driving force in the two most important actions on D-Day. He personally led the stalled 1st BN, 116th INF off the beach and personally opened the Vierville draw to 32 tanks of the 743rd TK BN, 11 functioning guns of the 58th Armored FA BN and other vehicular units. These heavy weapons could not engage targets beyond the mask of the bluffs from the beach. As illustrated on the adjoining map, BG Cota was all over the battlespace of the 29th Infantry Division on the western half of Omaha Beach during the assault. He walked, climbed, crawled or ran an astounding 17 miles under intense enemy fire! This distance was calculated using verifiable times and positions for the General based on Army records.

On December 6, 1945, MG Charles H. Gerhardt, CG, 29th Infantry Division wrote a statement that appears in Cota's Military Personnel Records, "His performance in the field as a combat commander, as a tactician, and as a courageous leader were unsur-

passed, and his conduct under fire on Omaha Beach on D-Day has become legend among the troops of the Division ... It can be stated without reservation that his contribution to the 29th Infantry Division and through it to the United States Government was prodigious". In support of this effort, LTG H Steven Blum (Ret) wrote, "Upon examination of the totality of Cota's Omaha Beach actions during the D-Day operation, one can strongly make a direct parallel with COL Joshua Chamberlain's actions at Gettysburg. In both cases, the outcome of these critical battles were inextricably resultant of the personal exceptional valor, the courageous and decisive actions and orders of these leaders that tipped a precarious balance. Neither Gettysburg, nor Omaha Beach, would have had the successful outcomes now recorded in our military history, if it were not for their personal presence and actions that day." Say a prayer, stay informed and sing a tune on behalf of our beloved General for success in this endeavor! 29 Let's Go!

On that date, this battalion participated, with assaulting infantry, in the attack of a fortified beach of Northern France under most hazardous and difficult conditions. Beginning its landing with the leading elements of assaulting infantry, in the face of withering enemy fire, all companies of the battalion were landed early in the day while the beach was still under heavy observed fire of artillery and small arms. 

"The only reason your package would have necessitated hospitalization would have been as the result of overeating. 24 June 1944 - Normandy


"After eleven hours sleep, a bath (in a bucket), a shave, clean clothes, I begin to feel almost like a human being again. And so I hope to be able to write a little more intelligently than I have been doing. Do not look for any literary masterpieces about the experiences of war from me because I do not intend to write any. Most of my correspondence shall be purely personal...The experiences of war are peculiar - some as they seem they should be - others far removed from any conception of war and all difficult to describe. A lot of it is forgotten in the original excitement. A lot more fades from memory in the subsequent stupor of fatigue."

I never really talked to my dad that much about The War. All eight of his children knew he'd been in World War II as a motion-picture photographer and had earned a Silver Star saving a fellow soldier, but we didn't know many, if any, details of his time in the army. We had seen some of his films of the Roer River Crossing: the decimated skeletal buildings, the dead sergeant face down on the ground with his blood pooled in the mud, the floating bridge with American

soldiers pouring across it into Julich. We had seen the photos of him in Paris walking the streets with his buddies right after the city was liberated. I was aware of these things. But that's about it. I actually knew very little about WWII in general. My dad, and my friends' dads, didn't talk about it; my high school didn't teach me much about it; and in college I learned nothing more. I always planned to talk to Dad more about his time in the army, but I got busy with my career and raising a family of my own. The years went by. We saw each other often, and we did talk a few times about his experiences in 1944 and 45. I learned a bit and wanted to learn more. Then one morning he suddenly died. Just like that he was gone.

After he died, feeling great regret, and missing him terribly, some of his kids began our own research. We learned that he was a part of Unit 125 of the 167th Photo Company, his close partner was a still photographer named Merle Nicholson, and that they were attached to the 29th Infantry Division led by General Charles Gerhardt. While filming with the 115th Infantry at the Setterich Mine on November 16, 1944, the first day of the Roer River Offensive, while


under heavy enemy fire, he crawled to a wounded man and carried him to safety at the command post. Later that day, he assisted with the evacuation of another wounded soldier. For this selfless reaction to someone in need, he was the first photographer in the entire Ninth Army to be awarded a Silver Star, and later in the war he received two Bronze Stars. He filmed the crossing of the Roer River and continued on with the 29th Infantry Division to meet up with the Russians at the Elbe River near Berlin. During our research we came across Joe Balkoski's insightful books on the campaign which really helped our family finally realize the depth of what our dad had experienced during the war.



He was a dedicated father to his eight children. Needless to say, we are all proud of him, we miss him a lot, and are forever grateful that we had such a good man as our dad.








James Marshall Smith 6 March 1920 - 12 June 1952



My father, Private James M. Smith, enlisted in the Virginia National Guard in Richmond, VA, 5 August 1940. Assigned to A Battery, 111th FA, 29th Division, he was in England in 1942-1944; then entered Omaha Beach with the 29th Division on 6 June 1944, D-Day.

The 111th lost their 105 howitzers to German fire and heavy surf. Lt. Col. Thornton Mullins ordered them to fight as infantry. When transports, trucks and artillery were replaced, my father was severely injured when his truck ran over a mine near the battle of Vire, on 9 August 1944. Spending a year in hospitals in France, Britain and the US. He did not return to Europe. He was discharged on 17 January 1945.


Upon returning to Richmond he married my mother, Ann Durvin. Dad's wounds, shrapnel from the mine, required he go back in the hospital at McQuire in Richmond periodically. Along with his injuries, he suffered from what was then called "shell shock" and "battle trauma," these effects he never fully recovered from. He died of coronary thrombosis 12 June 1952.

231st Transportation Truck Battalion

The all-black 231st Transportation Truck Battalion was the first National Guard unit from any state to serve in Korea when it arrived in December 1950. The unit was quickly put to use ferrying supplies to units defending the "Pusan Perimeter" against vastly superior communist forces. While serving in Korea, the unit was racially integrated along with the rest of the active Army. But when demobilized and returned to state service, the unit was again segregated. It wasn't until 1955, when the federal government threatened to revoke funding, that the unit, along with the rest of the Maryland National Guard was integrated.
